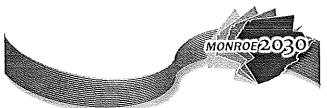

The Monroe County Board of Commissioners and Planning Commission are looking for feedback from municipalities regarding an optional \$5 fee for local transportation projects. Act 89 of 2013 provides counties with the option to generate transportation funding by assessing a \$5 fee on non-exempt vehicles (cars, motorcycles, buses, limousines, motor homes, trailers and semi-trailers) registered to an owner within the county. Given the number of such vehicles this would affect, approximately \$775,000 would be generated annually for local transportation projects.

While state and federal dollars are available for such transportation projects, local match dollars are almost always required. There are numerous local transportation projects which need funding every year, and Act 89 funds would help facilitate completion of such projects. The goal of utilizing these funds would be to increase safety, decrease damage to vehicles, improve quality of life, save money, promote economic development, create local jobs, and benefit locally owned businesses.

Enclosed you will find a survey requesting your input, as well as a list of Frequently Asked Questions regarding what projects would be eligible for these potential funds and basic information regarding Act 89 of 2013.

FAQs for Community Input on the \$5 Fee for Local Use for Transportation Projects in Monroe County

Q1. What part of Act 89 of 2013 allows Monroe County to pass an ordinance to levy a fee for local transportation use?

A1. On November 25, 2013, Act 89 of 2013 was approved and passed into law. Act 89 of 2013 amended the Vehicle Code, Title 75 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, by adding Section 1935 which outlines the establishment, levying, collection and distribution of the fee.

Q2. What percentage of the collected fee would be returned to Monroe County? A2.100%

Q3. What would be the effective date for imposition of the fee?

A3. No less than 90 days from when Monroe County would notify PennDOT of passage of an ordinance.

Q4. How much is the fee?

A4. The fee is \$5 annually per non-exempt vehicle.

Q5. Can Monroe County levy a fee of less than \$5?

A5. No. Section 1935 only provides for a fee of \$5 for each nonexempt vehicle registered to an address located in the county.

Q6. What are nonexempt vehicles?

A6. Those vehicles which are not exempt from registration fees under the Vehicle Code.

Q7. What are examples of nonexempt vehicles?

A7. Examples of nonexempt vehicles are cars, motorcycles, buses, limousines, motor homes, trailers and semi-trailers.

Q8. How many nonexempt vehicles are registered at an address located in Monroe County?

A8. As of April 10, 2016, there were 155,380 non-exempt vehicles registered at an address located in Monroe County. This number changes daily as people purchase and sell vehicles, and as they move from one county or state to another.

Q9. How much funding would the fee for local use generate for Monroe County?

A9. If 155,380 registrations were processed, Monroe County would receive \$776,900 in funding annually from the fee for local use.

Q12. What unit of PennDOT would collect the fee?

A12. Driver and Vehicle Services (DVS) would collect the fee as part of the vehicle registration process.

Q13. When would the fees be distributed to Monroe County?

A13. The collected fees would be distributed in June and December annually.

Q16. Could the fee for local use be put into the County General Fund and used for non-transportation related projects?

A16. No. The fee for local use must be used for transportation related projects.

Q18. What are some examples of how the fee can be used?

A18. Examples of Acceptable Expenditures include:

- Construction, reconstruction, maintenance, and repair of public roads/streets or bridges
 for which the county or municipality is legally responsible including a roadway open to
 the use of the public for vehicular travel on grounds of a college or university or public or
 private school or public or historical park.
- Costs of property damages resulting from road and/or bridge construction, reconstruction, or maintenance.
- 3. Purchase of right-of-way for road and/or bridge construction, reconstruction, or maintenance.
- Compensation of viewers for services in eminent domain proceedings involving roads, highways, and bridges.
- 5. Interest and principal payments on road or bridge loans and bonds or sinking fund charges for such bonds becoming due within that current calendar year.
- 6. Any road or bridge work by order of the Public Utility Commission (PUC).
- Culverts and drainage structures.
- 8. Acquisition, maintenance, repair, electrification, and operation of traffic signs and traffic signal control systems at intersections and/or railroad crossings.
- 9. Maintenance on alleys, ways, and courts in counties, townships, boroughs, and cities provided the municipality can demonstrate it has a legal responsibility for the alley, way, or court.
- 10. Minor equipment, equipment rentals, or repair parts for road maintenance vehicles.
- 11. Road drags and snow fence.
- 12. Purchase of PennDOT-approved materials.
- 13. Major road and bridge equipment (equipment costs in excess of \$4,000).
- 14. County Engineer's salary and benefit costs for road or bridge work.
- 15. Debris removal from the roadway and its gutters and shoulders.
- 16. Erection of street name signs, traffic directing signs, and traffic signal control systems.
- 17. Brush removal to improve sight distance.
- 18. Lane and crosswalk painting and marking.
- 19. Cleaning of inlets and culverts.
- 20. Certain structures such as salt storage sheds or buildings built to house county or municipal owned road equipment.
- 21. Engineering fees (fees in excess of 10% of the total contract price must be documented and justified to the satisfaction of the Municipal Services District Office).
- 22. Curb ramps to provide access by individuals with disabilities in accordance with the current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and PennDOT standards.
- 23. Driveway grade adjustments due to construction or reconstruction.
- 24. Liability insurance for road and bridge equipment and vehicles when the named beneficiary is the entity's Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.
- 25. Administrative costs to a maximum of 10% of that year's total allocation, including benefits, overhead, and other administrative charges for county employees directly involved in permitted activities. (Note: expenditures must be documented and may be paid directly or charged as a mark-up on direct costs as part of an approved indirect cost allocation plan when the basis of the charge is consistent with charges to other county departments and the level of activity of the fund.)
- 26. Indirect engineering and transportation planning costs. (Note: The total indirect cost that may be expended in any year is limited to the 10% administrative allowance (see number 26 above). Direct engineering costs either contracted or in house are not included as either indirect or administrative costs. The reimbursement of prior year indirect costs is not permitted nor is any carry forward of eligibility authorized.)
- 27. Appraisal fees for infrastructure assets (as required by GASB 34).

- 28. Curbs that are part of the drainage system.
- 29. Inspection costs associated with roadway and bridge structures such as signs, signals, culverts, drainage structures and bridges.
- 30. Transportation related safety studies or safety projects on public highways.
- 31. Meeting the match requirement for Department highway and bridge projects and highway and bridge projects funded under the Multimodal Fund.
- 32. The construction of sound walls if included in a highway project as a mitigation measure for environmental purposes and all warrants are met.
- 33. The portions of pedestrian trails located within highway right-of-ways.
- 34. Repayment of or as security for Pennsylvania Infrastructure Bank loans with previous approval of the District Municipal Services Representative.
- 35. Other expenditures determined, on a case-by-case basis, to be consistent with the requirements and restrictions of Article 8/Section 11 of the Pennsylvania Constitution.

Q19. What are some examples of how the fee cannot be used?

A19. Examples of Unacceptable Expenditures include:

- 1. Parks, municipal buildings, or playgrounds.
- 2. Police departments, fire departments, or historic, charitable, or civic projects.
- 3. Private property drives.
- 4. Sidewalks not involved with road or bridge realignment projects.
- 5. Sanitary sewers, water lines, or utility costs.
- 6. Garbage or recycling pick-up.
- 7. Construction projects without prior Department approval.
- 8. Undocumented payroll expenditures.
- 9. Gasoline purchases for private vehicles.
- 10. Retroactive expenditures.
- 11. Transit-related expenditures.
- 12. The construction of sounds walls if not included in a highway project as a mitigation measure for environmental purposes and/or does not meet all warrants.
- 13. The portion of pedestrian trails that are not located within highway right-of-way.
- 14. Other expenditures that do not comply with Section 1935 or the County Code.

Q20. Could Monroe County exempt vehicles other than those exempt under the Vehicle Code?

A20. No.

Q22. Are the owners of ATVs or boats subject to the fee?

A22. No. ATVs are registered by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and the Fish and Boat Commission respectively, not PennDOT.

Q24. Could the fee be used for transit purposes?

A24. No. Transit is not a highway or bridge purpose within the confines of Article 8, Section 11.

Q25. What are the audit requirements for the fee?

A25. All Fee for Local Use Funds are subject to audit annually by the Pennsylvania Department of the Auditor General in accordance with the requirements of Section 403 of the Fiscal Code, 72 P.S. § 403.

Q26. Have any other counties enacted an ordinance implementing the \$5 fee for local use? If so, which ones?

A26. Yes. They are: Allegheny, Berks, Beaver, Blair, Bucks, Cambria, Centre, Chester, Cumberland, Dauphin, Fulton, Greene, Lycoming, Montgomery, Philadelphia, Schuylkill, Westmoreland, and York.

Initial reactions to a survey regarding a \$5 dollar vehicle registration fee to provide funding for local transportation projects have raised concerns and questions regarding how the funds will be distributed. This memorandum will attempt to outline the basic structure of and method for allocating these monies to local municipalities. It is the intent of the county to ensure that all funds raised by adopting an Act 89 ordinance are fairly distributed in a transparent and equitable manner.

If adequate support exists and the ordinance is adopted, there would be a four-year initiative with a sunset clause in which the program will expire or be extended. If adopted, PennDOT will provide up to \$2,000,000 in matching funds. Based on the number of vehicles registered in 2016, this would generate approximately \$1,277,000 each year for the four-year period.

- 155,380 vehicles registered in 2016
- \$776,900 would have been generated
- \$3,107,600 over a 4 year period
- \$2,000,000 matching PennDOT funds.

\$1,276,900 per year for local transportation projects over a four year period

As for the distribution of funds, a volunteer subcommittee of the Monroe County Planning Commission will be formed, consisting of local municipal supervisors/council members, roadmasters, and/or other appointed municipal representatives. The subcommittee will accept applications for transportation projects and make recommendations to the County Commissioners for the release of funds. The potential projects will be ranked on criteria based on safety, return on investment, fair distribution, and other factors.

Funds will be available solely for transportation projects that meet Act 89 requirements.

Details and specifics are still being worked out, and we would value and input or opinions concerning the program are appreciated.

I learned most recently that there is a serious movement in our State Legislature to take \$40 million dollars from the 911 fund to help "fix" the Commonwealth's budget debacle. It is imperative that you write to your state and local representatives to **NOT** to support this move.

It is not a "piggy bank" of play money for people to use when they make bad fiscal decisions in Harrisburg. The sole intent is to augment public safety communications systems.

All 9-1-1 Centers use this revenue to supplement the 911 system; installations, maintenance and upgrades as technology changes. Should any portion go away, the collateral damage will be the sole cause of your dispatching fees to spiral out of control.

It is my true hope that we fill the mailboxes and voice mail systems of any State Senator or State Representatives to implore them not to allow this egregious maneuver to happen.

Bottom Line Up Front – We need your help protecting the 9-1-1 Fund.

Two days ago, a House legislative proposal ("Taxpayers Budget") was released purportedly to close the 2017-2018 fiscal year budget gap. Part of the proposal relies on transferring 40 million dollars from the 9-1-1 Fund to the Pennsylvania's General Fund. The press release for the House Legislative proposal made three statements that are not accurate related specifically to the 9-1-1 fund:

"We will not negatively impact one service" – Strategic and financial planning earmark specific uses for all 9-1-1 funds (83%, 15%, 2%). Removal of any funds would negatively impact the NG9-1-1 plan vital to the sustainment of a viable 9-1-1 system. In addition, misappropriation of funds (non-911 use) will render PA ineligible to receive federal funding (Next Gen 911 Advancement Act 2012). The federal funding stream will be critical to the financial planning for NG9-1-1 network implementation.

"There is a lack of transparency associated with the use of these funds [receiving and spending activities]" – PEMA publishes an Annual Report that provides detailed financial activity for PEMA and all PSAPs. All activity associated with the 9-1-1 fund is reported to the 9-1-1 Advisory Board quarterly in a public meeting. Additionally, a Legislative Report was published by PEMA that describes the accomplishments of the 911 community and provides guidance on the NG9-1-1 migration path. Accomplishments and plans provide a transparent look at the use of 9-1-1 funds.

"We have targeted the surplus in these funds"— The current revenue received from the 9-1-1 fee enacted with Act 12 of 2015 has dramatically decreased the deficit present to operate the statewide 9-1-1 system. But, a \$22M deficit was still present in 2016 when 911 fee revenue was compared to documented expenses. There is no recorded surplus in the 9-1-1 fund.

Because of all your work and with the support of responsible Legislators, Act 12 of 2015 established in the Pennsylvania Treasury a non-lapsing, restricted revenue account to be known as the "9-1-1 Fund." 53 Pa. C.S. 5306.1(a). The law specifically states that "money in the fund shall be used only for reasonably necessary costs that enhance, operate or maintain a 9-1-1 system in this Commonwealth in accordance with the Statewide 9-1-1 plan established by the agency." 35 Pa. C.S. 5306.1(c)(1). The law also expressly prohibits transfer of money from the 9-1-1 Fund for "General Fund use by the Commonwealth or counties." 53 Pa. C.S. 5306.1(c)(3).

Even though our Attorneys advise a transfer of 40 million dollars from the 9-1-1 Fund is strictly impermissible according to the current law, we all know laws can change and we must pay close attention to the 9-1-1 fund as budget related proposals continue to be developed in the House.

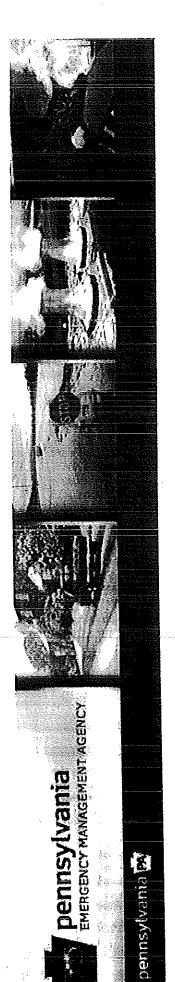

This House legislative proposal is simply an attempt to shift more financial liability for NG 9-1-1 directly to the County during a period of time when County governments are already dealing with stretched budget obligations. Pennsylvania citizens pay \$1.65 on each device in good faith that those dollars are being used for the purpose Act 12 of 2015 intends. Pennsylvania citizens rightfully expect that when they need to call 9-1-1, it will be available. At best, the attempt to shift money from the 9-1-1 Fund further exacerbates issues county PSAPs are trying to rectify through PEMA's 9-1-1 Grant Program: namely, replacement or purchase of necessary equipment, consolidation of county PSAPs for more effective and efficient services, and continued build out of interconnectivity among all Pennsylvania PSAPs; and at worst, may compromise the safety and security that Pennsylvania citizens expect of the 9-1-1 community.

Is there 40 million dollars 'sitting" in the 9-1-1 fund? Absolutely not – there were no details provided with the House legislative proposal as to when they looked at the 9-1-1 fund balance so it is very hard to pinpoint exactly what the 9-1-1 fund balance represented. However, there are many reasons for the balance – we receive monthly submissions from the carriers and distribute the funds to you quarterly, so there is a balance between those periods of time – we awarded many 15% interconnectivity projects last year and those funds are paid out by milestone, the remaining balance of the 15% statewide interconnectivity funding is committed to 2016 grants or is dedicated to 2017 grant awards based on the applications recently submitted

Finally, transfer of money from the 9-1-1 Fund may make the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and its counties ineligible for a new NG 9-1-1 federal grant program that is expected to be released in early 2018. Similar federal grant programs required state applicants to certify that state 9-1-1 Funds were not diverted for any other use in the 180-days prior to the grant application, or during the federal grant period. Those states who had diverted funds were either ineligible for 9-1-1 federal grant opportunities, or were required to pay back the federal grant money that was received. Based on previous grant funding opportunities, diversion of state 9-1-1 funds, as contemplated in the House legislative proposal, could leave almost 7 million in federal grant dollars on the table that Pennsylvania would not be able to access to assist with NG 9-1-1.

This is a critical issue for PEMA, and its 9-1-1 Office. PEMA believes it is also a critical issue for Pennsylvania PSAPs and their associated governments. We encourage you to contact your local legislative members to oppose the House legislative proposal.

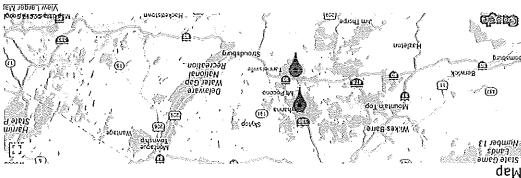

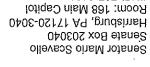
